MONCHY-BRETON CHURCHYARD
Pas de Calais, France
Grave Reference: N/A

Monchy Breton is a small village in the department of Pas-de-Calais, some 35 kilometres north-west of Arras. Take the N39 Arras-St Pol; at Tincques turn right in the direction of Chelers, Monchy Breton. The churchyard is in the centre of the village. One plot is in the north-west part of the churchyard against the church wall, and the second plot is in the south-west part.

Nov 23, 1944

Mr. and Mrs. A.M. Waite of 1009 20th Street, have received word that their son, PO Allan Halford Waite, missing since February 21st, was buried in a communal cemetery at Moncey-a-Breton, France, on the date on which they were advised he was missing. A pilot of a Halifax bomber of the Aloutte Squadron, which was hit during a 1000-plane attack over Stuttgart, four of the crew were taken prisoner, while two managed to get back to Britain. One of the former, Flight-Sergeant Glen Gibson, 2212 Bellevue Avenue, was a chum of the deceased, and a mid-upper gunner on the bomber. PO Waite had just turned 18 when he joined the RCAF in October, 1941, going overseas in May, 1943. (West Van News)
